Eco Explorers

The Eco Explorer camp took place at Lower Winskill Farm on Tuesday &

Wednesday, 16 & 17 August. Tent, gazebo & camping trailer with awning were erected on Monday morning, when we made the decision to run the camp on Tuesday, as the thunderstorm forecast had abated: Tom Lord didn't think it a good idea to come if there were storms, as we were not able to use his barn this year. In fact, it was a lovely sunny day. 8 families came (10 adults & 13 children) and enjoyed family games, art work, geology, looking at bird flight, and a nature walk. Snack & lunch items were prepared by 2 helpers.

Wednesday early morning was extremely windy, so Keith & I went to the farm at 6.30am to sort out the tent (pegs pulled out of the shallow, stony

ground) and gazebo, which had collapsed! The trailer tent & awning were thankfully not affected, so we moved activity materials over there from the tent, in case the strong wind persisted. In fact, it was abating as we left at 7.40 and the day became warmer and bright for our guests.

We had a big crowd: 12 families with 16 adults and 28 children. There was a happy, busy atmosphere for the activities, with stream dipping in the afternoon attracting most of them, despite the walk to Catrigg Beck. The team of 3 catered for us all very well, with all the food consumed. It was a successful event, despite the weather problems, which didn't actually impinge on the families, just on the organisers!

When the site which Booths now occupies was a field, much of the boundary wall was topped with triangular stones. These stones were regularly vandalised and thrown on the ground. This really annoyed my brother, who knew that these stones would be very costly to replace.

After Ian's death I decided to do something about the situation in his memory, so I wrote to the Craven District Council but never received a reply. Many weeks later, I was walking into Settle and encountered two workmen mixing cement and firmly replacing the top stones. I cheerfully said "Hello. I am so pleased something is being done about those stones." I was silenced by their somewhat brusque reply: "Yes. Some silly B___H in Giggleswick has written in about them." I continued my walk into Settle.
