Please put this date in your diary. Following on from the huge success of 'Let's Talk Rubbish' last year, St. John's Eco Group are putting the emphasis on LOCAL this year.

Come along to church to see all that is wonderful about living in this part of the world. We encourage you to support our local businesses, our local talent and to make the most of what they have to offer. Shopping locally is great for the environment and by keeping these places open gives character and individuality to the area. We have great speakers:

2.15pm Simon from Courtyard Dairy will show why they are world beating cheesemongers. 3.15pm John Dawson, who spoke to us in one of our services earlier this year, will be explaining why we should put our trust in local farmers and related businesses.

4.15pm Dan Nelson, the latest in a long family line of shoemakers in Settle, will be telling us about his craft, making the saying "Make do and Mend" into an art form.

Meanwhile in the other rooms in the building we will have stalls and displays from a wide range of shopkeepers, charity workers, craftspeople and other groups with LOCAL at the centre of their work – members of our town council, Settle Hub (remember their spicy rice pudding from last year!), our community police team, the food bank, Plastic Free Settle. Justice and Peace Group

The Churches Together Justice and Peace group will show the film 'Everything Must Change' at the Victoria Hall on Tuesday 12th September, at 7.30 pm (admission free).

Cost of living, climate change, food, housing, land: the multiple crises we face are deeply interlinked, which means the solutions are too. 'Everything Must Change' draws on the experience of numerous inspiring social movements. The film argues that we need to concentrate much more on emissions arising at the point of production, rather than at the level of consumption. This means building a global movement ourselves to enact that transition, as a matter of priority.

The maker of the film will be present and will lead a discussion afterwards about the concrete steps which can be taken.

A letter from Christine Caddy

Dear friends

I arrived in Bentham (reasonably) fit and well and looking forward to a new challenge. We felt 'at home' very quickly and have loved our time living and working with you all. It was something of a shock to find, following a concern from my lovely hairdresser Jemma, that I received a diagnosis of a cancerous and aggressive tumour on my forehead. The next day I went to lead worship at Westhouse (Cornerstone) and felt loved and cared for and able to share the diagnosis with them, which began a wonderful period of being supported in prayer and, as the news spread around the Circuit, we received so much uplifting prayer and support in all sorts of practical ways. Some delivered meals, some drove me to radiotherapy appointments. Some visited or wrote and sent cards. We felt so loved.

Then came Covid with all its challenges, finding new ways of supporting one another pastorally and new ways to worship, apart and yet together.

Living in Bentham has been a joy. The area so beautiful, the people welcoming, caring, hardworking and friendly. A fine manse. Lovely local shops and good local coffee shops. An excellent GP practice, with Dr McKirdy, and the nursing staff, who supported me in all my health problems.

This year has been very difficult. We knew, with retirement coming and a house move that it would be a busy year but: in March, visiting Manchester with Emilie, I fell. I shattered my right humerus into 6 pieces and dislodged it from my shoulder. Fixing it required complex surgery and I spent some time in hospital in Lancaster. Much physio will be needed for some time. However, in May I suddenly collapsed, was rushed to hospital, and

knew nothing for 5 days and nights, sedated and ventilated in Intensive Care. It was a terrible time for Stephen and Emilie who were called in to say 'goodbye' as I hovered between life and death. A sepsis infection had attacked my body and damaged my kidneys which needed surgery and a long stay in hospital. The NHS were wonderful, and they pulled me through, though I will need further surgery later in the year. Then a few weeks later (right on top of the move) I collapsed again. Back to Intensive Care, this time in York, and then to Coronary Care. Blood thickening caused by the sepsis had caused a large Pulmonary Embolism in my lung which shifted and stopped the blood flow to my heart. A doctor described me as 'very poorly'.

I am home now, in our new home, recovering. Sadly, I didn't get to return to Bentham to say my goodbyes, hence this letter.

I wanted to write as widely as possible to send my love to you all and to say a huge 'Thank You' for all you have done for Stephen and me over the last 5 years. We will look back very fondly to our time in the Settle Circuit, the joy for me of being part of the worshipping congregation at Newby and the wonder of living in one of God's most beautiful places on Earth.

For those who would like it I have added our new contact details. If you are ever in the East Riding give us a ring and come and visit; we would love to see you. I will one day return to Bentham!
